COOKING WITH WINE

Buttery Wine Risotto with Smoked Salmon

Ingredients (serves 4)

1½ litres	Chicken Stock
250 ml	Dry White Wine
40 gm	Butter
1	Medium leek (about 350 gm) chopped finely
2	Cloves Garlic, crushed
400 gm	Arborio rice (or other risotto rice)
¼ teaspoon	Ground Turmeric
40 gm	Butter, chopped finely (extra)
40 gm	Parmesan Cheese, finely grated (grate your own)
100 gm	Smoked Salmon, chopped coarsely
2 teaspoons	Fresh Dill, finely chopped
50 gm	Baby Spinach leaves

Bring stock (you can use a stock cube) and wine to a boil in a medium saucepan. Reduce the heat, cover and keep hot.

Heat the first butter in a large saucepan. Cook the leek and garlic, stirring until the leek is very soft. Add the rice and turmeric and stir to coat the rice in the buttery mixture. Stir in one cupful of the stock mixture. Cook, stirring over a low heat until the liquid is absorbed.

Continue adding stock mixture, one cupful at a time, stirring after each addition.

The total cooking time should be about 35 minutes or until the rice is tender. Remove the pan from the heat, stir in the extra butter, the parmesan cheese, smoked salmon, dill and spinach, which should just wilt in the heat.

Enjoy with a glass of good dry white wine.

She had an excellent article on winemaking published in the November issue of 'The Garden', the magazine of the Royal Horticultural Society. The article mentioned NAWB and gave the address of our website. This publicity all helps to give me some hope for the future of our hobby,

especially as we have had a sudden influx of new winemakers at the Ware club. Just like buses, three of them turned up all at once.

The National show is quite early this year, so we all need to get cracking – please make my domestic life tranquil and get your entry forms in early. Just to show you how serious I am, I was winemaking on Christmas day. Well it's better than playing games or watching television! Also, please try and encourage some new people to join us in Hull. Everyone who attended in 2011 was most impressed with the hotel and the staff, so I'm sure that we will have another excellent weekend.

SWEET PARSNIP & ORANGE WINE

Parsnips are reaching their best for wine making about now so I thought it a good time to repeat a members set recipe. The recipe was set by Charles Shelton, many times winner of "NAWB Master". It was quite special for me because I won the class which was judged by Charles and a lot of other prizes at shows all over the country. The recipe called for white grape concentrate but, without the need to follow a set recipe, I would probably substitute a litre of white grape juice from the supermarket.

Ingredients (1 gallon)	
3 lb	Parsnips
½ lb	Raisins (use the best brand)
½ pint	White grape concentrate
OR	
1 litre	White grape juice
2	Oranges
2	Lemons
1	Vitamin B1 tablet
1 tsp	Pectolytic Enzyme
1 tsp	Nutrients
1 tsp	Tartaric acid
1 tsp	Bentonite
¼ tsp	Tannin
	Sugar to starting gravity 1.085 + more (see method)
	Wine Yeast (Gervin C)

Method

Wash the parsnips well to remove the soil, peel and cut the parsnips into one inch cubes. Place into a pan with 3 pints of water and bring to boil, simmer until they are soft but not mushy.

Strain the hot liquid into a fermenting bucket (use the parsnips for cooking, they can be frozen into portions for later use with meals). Rinse the oranges and lemons in hot water to remove any preservatives, slice and add to the bucket. Wash and mince the raisins and

add to the bucket. Add the concentrate or white grape juice. Top up to one gallon using cooled boiled water, add nutrient, Vit B1 tablet, pectolase, tannin, acid, bentonite and yeast. Add enough sugar to bring the starting gravity up to 1.085. Ferment for six days in the bucket, then strain the liquid into a demijohn.

Keep adding 5 oz sugar each time the gravity of the must drops to 1.010 until fermentation ceases.

Clear the wine and sweeten to balance.

MESSAGE FROM YOUR SHOW MANAGER

I hope you are all booked in for Hull on the 15th –17th March 2013. If not you need to do so urgently (see show schedule for details). I am sure the Mercure staff will look after us just as they did in 2011.

As some of you may already know we will be going to Coventry from the 4th—6th April 2014. The Royal Court Hotel, Tamworth Road, Keresley.

Why Coventry? Well your committee felt it would be hard to go back to Hutton Moor Leisure Centre in Weston-super-Mare. Those dissatisfied were growing, we were spoilt at Hull, and we wanted more of the same. We looked very hard in the Weston-super-Mare, Bristol and Cheltenham areas. All the hotels were too small or too expensive. When we finally one that was suitable the corkage charge of £1,000 put in out of the question.

Out of the blue I was contacted by Martin Jenkins, event sales manager for Pontin's. I had a very good meeting with him and he came up with a few proposals. Most of their Britannia Hotels were on the south coast, which makes access difficult for our Northern members (north of Watford Gap). National Association of Wine & Beer-makers (Amateur) Minutes of the 54th Annual Conference held on Sunday 25th March 2012 at Weston-super-Mare

1) Chairman Peter Robinson commenced the meeting at 10.40am by asking the President, Bob Marsdon to open the meeting.

2) President Address

Bob Marsdon welcomed and thanked all those attending the meeting, saying that it was almost 20 years, since we had held our first National Conference at Weston Super Mare in 1993. On his first visit to Weston he had expected a quiet sedate seaside resort, however he was surprised whilst taking a walk to the Winter Gardens to find a couple having a fracas on the front. As he approached the woman hit the man and then they were fighting like fury. This attracted an audience, but nobody tried to separate them. A policeman was summoned, who tried to calm the situation but to no avail. So eventually the policeman got out his baton, but the man wrestled and got the baton and then started to attack the policeman – but then a worse situation arose..... a crocodile ran off with the sausages!!! It's the way he tells them! That's the way to do it!

He then went on to say that Peter and his committee know how to do it – they know how to plan a conference, they know how to put on a show; in fact they had even got a 'Pulley' to help lift some of the weight – a warm welcome back to Dave! Bob concluded by the remembrance of Absent Friends and officially opened the A.G.M.

4) Minutes of the 2011 AGM

The minutes were accepted as a true record – this was proposed by Mervyn Bartalis and seconded by Harry Rose.

There were no matters arising.

5) Chairman's Report

Peter Robinson commenced by presenting the committee and outlining their skills and responsibilities. Peter also mentioned that although he had been able to fill most of the positions on the committee, the secretary post was still vacant and although Kate had been of great assistance, she had really only done the secretarial role on a temporary basis; so his one appeal would be for someone to take over from Kate, giving her a well earned break, so that she could just concentrate on her role as insurance officer.

After last year's highly successful event in Hull, Peter was disappointed with the response this year, due to the lack of people attending and the lower bottle entry; this may mean that we shall sustain a significant loss over this year. We are all set for Hull next year, but we shall have to give serious thought about where to hold the event in 2014. He did realize that some people were missing due to illness, but this venue was not a popular choice with some members, in particular they felt that the sports hall was not suitable. Peter asked for comments from the floor regarding this situation, later on in the meeting. He thought it was difficult to assess where the hobby was going, but there were some encouraging signs of new interest, with bottle entry up in some areas, a wine circle with over 70 members; and also on the positive front 4 new beer candidates taking the exam this year. He hoped to see everyone in Hull next year, joined by those friends that were unable to make this year.

6) Treasurer's Report

Jan Nangreave presented full accounts for the year 2010 / 2011 which were printed in the January 2012 edition of News & Views. The total balance as of 30th June 2011 was £11566.96. Total income for the year was £15643.55, and total expenditure £13430.44. Excess expenditure over income was £2213.11. 2012. On behalf of everybody on the committee I would like to say a huge thank you to those who supported the Christmas draw.

Jan reported last year that as interest had become so low on the RBS account, a High Interest Account had been opened with Standard Life, with a view to at least making some gain on the money we have in the bank. She was pleased to report that we received £79.29 in interest in the financial year to

COLIN PARTON (1938-2012)

Colin, who was NAWB Master Brewer on 3 occasions, sadly passed away in October. Colin joined NAWB in 2005, and was joint Master Brewer in 2006, and won outright in 2007 and 2010. The last of these was his most remarkable achievement, as he was receiving chemotherapy treatment which prevented him attending the National and limited his ability to make beer at the time. However, eight bottles can be enough if you get 3 firsts and 3 other places. Another significant contribution Colin made to NAWB was to come up with the suggestion that major trophy winners should receive a certificate to provide them with a permanent reminder of their achievement.

Colin was of course a great friend of Bill Elks and they enjoyed the healthy competition between them, probably coming about even over the years. Colin was also always willing to help out other brewers when starting out, with his surplus equipment and good advice. A feature of his beers, was that given the same recipe, his effort would always finish at lower gravity (and hence higher alcohol) than anyone else's example. We still joke at our beer group when anyone comes up with a low finishing gravity that someone must be using Colin's special hydrometer.

Colin's other passions in life apart from beer, were his family (he was married to Sandra for over 50 years), Tottenham Hotspur and golf. When he was no longer able to drive, I used to give him a lift to our beer group and I always enjoyed our chats in the car. During his illness over the past 3½ years he showed great courage and strength and defied all the medical predictions.

Perhaps his spirit is best summed up by a conversation I recall on one of those journeys. It went something like this:

Me: How are you feeling today Colin?

Colin: A bit weary Peter.

Me: I suppose that's to be expected with the chemotherapy.

Colin: Yes. The round of golf I played this morning probably didn't help either.

Colin will be greatly missed by Sandra, his children Georgia and Daniel, and all his friends at the Beds & Herts Brewers.

A NOTE OF THANKS FROM KATE

Kate has asked me to thank you all for the kind thoughts expressed at the time of Richard's funeral and also for the charitable donations.

The donations came to total of £638 and these were split between two charities, £319 each to Cancer Research and to Hospital at Home.

30th June 2011. In an attempt to gain a little more interest, she transferred some additional funds to this account. This does entail keeping a close eye on the current account to ensure funds to not fall too low, but the result of this is that we have received £77.30 in interest in the first three quarters of this financial year, putting us on target for a projected £100.
