COOKING WITH WINE AND BEER

Chinkiang vinegar scallops with ham

We would use this as a starter but in China it would more usually be served with other dishes at a dinner party. Cooking fish and shellfish, and even chicken, with vinegar is common in the Jiangsu region which neighbours Shanghai. Chinese dishes such as this cook really quickly so make sure everything is prepared before you start.

Recipe by Ching-He Huang.

Ingredients (serves 2)

6 oz	Raw Scallops on the shell
2 tbsp	groundnut oil
1 tbsp	freshly grated root ginger
2½ oz	diced cooked roasted ham (or unsmoked lardons)
1 tbsp	Shaohsing rice wine (or dry sherry)
1 tbsp	Chinkiang black rice vinegar (or balsamic vinegar)
½ tbsp	light soy sauce
	1 small handful of fresh coriander leaves and stalks finely chopped
	Mixed exotic salad leaves to serve

Method

Remove the scallops from their shells, then remove and discard the hard muscle on the side. Leave the coral on, or if you do not like it you can remove it. Trim and rinse the scallops and pat dry

Heat a wok or pan over a high heat and add the groundnut oil. Add the ginger and stir fry for a few seconds.

Add the scallops and ham or lardons and stir fry for 30

seconds. Add the rice wine or sherry, the vinegar and soy sauce and cook for one minute to reduce the sauce. The scallops will turn opaque as they cook.

Once the scallops are cooked, add the coriander and mix well. Turn out onto a serving dish and serve immediately with mixed salad leaves.

NAWB COMMITTEE VACANCIES

We urgently need some reinforcements to join the Committee at the AGM in April. Normally, we decide what new members will take at the Committee meeting after the AGM, but I thought it might be useful to nominate the specific posts that we need to fill and detail what jobs entail.

First a bit of general detail. Nominations are for three year terms, although of course you can resign at any time. We meet near Leicester three times a year, normally in April, September and January. Meetings start at 10:30, we organise our own lunch - everyone brings something and we hope to get away around 3 to 3:30. For some posts attendance at all committee meetings is not essential - the important meeting is the one in January which precedes the show.

The two posts we need to fill are General Secretary and Fundraising Secretary. If anyone is interested in taking on one of these roles, please email or phone me. Please don't leave it to someone else - without some additional help we may not be able to continue - some committee members are already doing two or three jobs.

The terms of reference are as follows:

Fundraising Secretary

- 1) Overall co-ordination of all fundraising activities at the annual show, specifically the tombola and raffles (Friday & Saturday evenings).
- 2) Record all costs and expenses and hand balance sheet to the Treasurer.
- 3) Send letters to potential donors.
- 4) Send letters to all members asking for their support/donations for the tombola in "News & Views".
- 5) Arrange helpers to run the tombola stall.
- 6) Ensure that donors are acknowledged and thanked either collectively or individually as appropriate.
- 7) Obtain raffle prizes.
- 8) Assist with fundraising draw administration, including publicity and obtaining prizes (should it be decided to run one of these again in the future).

Sue Robson has details of volunteers and contacts that she has used in the past, so this job should not prove too onerous. This is one of the posts for which attendance at all committee meetings is probably not essential.

Dr John Harrison (1925 – 2010)

John Harrison; a pioneer of home wine and beer making as we know it today; sadly passed away on 29th November 2010. John was born on the Channel Island of Guernsey in 1925 and came to England when three months old. He lived in Ealing but was evacuated to High Wycombe during World War II. He later saw service in the RAF.

John graduated as a Doctor of Science and was employed at the GPO Research Establishment, at Dollis Hill in West London. It was here, that John formed a winemakers' club in November 1961. As there was not enough support from Post Office staff at Dollis Hill, it was decided to go public and the Wembley Guild of Winemakers was formed in June 1962.

John soon became well known at other winemaking circles, delivering lectures and promoting a scientific approach for the betterment of our hobby. John's own wines which he made in rather large quantities, won many plaudits; made as they were, using plenty of fruit that he gathered locally. John became a founder member of the renowned Durden Park Beermakers in 1971 and in 1973 suggested that the beer circle should research, make and evaluate ales and beers of bygone days. John, with his scientific background, led this research culminating in the publication of the highly acclaimed book "Old British Beers and How to Make Them".

John Harrison was very active in the Middlesex Federation, as a committee member and president, until ill health curtailed all his much valued wine and beer making activities. We should raise our glass to the memory of a legend in our hobby—Dr John Harrison!

National Association of Wine & Beermakers (Amateur) Minutes of the 52nd Annual Conference held on Sunday 28th March 2010 at Weston-super-Mare

- 1). Chairman Kate Edge opened the meeting at 10.30 a.m. and asked the President, Harry Rose, to open the meeting. Harry called for a period of silence for absent friends, before welcoming everyone to the 52nd Annual General Meeting, and declaring the meeting open. 57 members attended the meeting.
- 2). Apologies for absence previously received by the Secretary were read out by the Secretary from: Gavan Dixon; Daphne and Tony Grant; Wendy and Alan Eldret; Keith Jones; Ray Wightman; Diane and Colin Tweed; Maureen and Bill Elks; Edna and Andrew Bristow; and Kevin Martin. Apologies were recorded at the meeting from Sue Bennett; Colin Tate-Loverly; Jackie and Richard Baldwin.
- 3). The minutes of the 2009 AGM were accepted as an accurate record – this was proposed by Bob Marsdon and seconded by Bernard Lamb.
- 4). There were no matters arising from the minutes.

5). Chairman's Report

Kate Edge started by introducing the committee and their responsibilities. She pointed out that although no longer a member of the committee, Alan Eldret is continuing his work as Supplies Officer and providing a valuable service to members. Kate also pointed out that our treasurer Jan Nangreave had made significant savings by taking advantage of last year's reduced rate of VAT. Kate appealed to members to keep the committee informed of any changes in contact details to assist us in membership and insurance administration. She thanked her team for their hard work during the year and this was endorsed by the floor.

Kate thanked everyone for attending, hoped that they had enjoyed the weekend and wished them success in other shows during the year. She drew attention to the problems regarding the venue for the 2011 conference, with the Spa having increased charges from £720 to £6,000, this is no longer a viable venue. This was only known one month ago, and since then members of the committee have been researching alternatives. A number of possible venues have been identified and the most promising are being further

investigated. Kate asked any members with knowledge of potential venues to contact a member of the committee.

On a more optimistic note, Kate observed that the current economic climate and proposed increases in excise duties could help to further interest in home winemaking. She observed that NAWB and her own wine circle have gained new members and called upon everyone to strive to increase membership in the year ahead.

6). Treasurer's Report

Janice Nangreave drew attention to the full accounts that were printed in the January 2010 version of News and Views. The total balance as at 30th June 2009 was £9,579.88. Income and expenditure were both considerably lower than the previous year due to the one off costs of the Weston 50th anniversary dinner. Janice drew attention to the following aspects of the accounts:

- ◆ Costs of trophies, glasses, rosettes and engraving have been shown as a separate item (£889.12).
- ◆ Payments for Scarborough were £721 compared with estimated costs of £2,200 for Weston. The Spa has always subsidised the Weston show in the past.
- ◆ Bank interest was reduced by over £200 due to interest rate reductions.
- ◆ There were significant savings on committee expenses, with a further reduction projected for 2010 from the movement of meetings to Scraftoft Village Hall.

Janice thanked everyone for their generosity during the weekend, with income from the raffle, tombola and bingo standing at £640. She stated that she had received considerable feedback regarding the Friday evening, where we had dispensed with any music, and that these comments will be taken on board and discussed by the Committee.

There were no questions regarding the accounts, which were accepted as a true record, proposed by Charles Shelton and seconded by Al Procter.

7) Membership Report

Joe Lee welcomed the new members to the Conference. Whilst 28 members had not renewed, we have recruited 18 new members. This leaves the total membership at 295 compared with 305 last year.

Joe appealed to members to make sure that they use the correct contact details. Correspondence is still going to Audrey and to Joe's old address.

SEVILLE ORANGE APERITIF

Here is a recipe to produce a dry citrus aperitif using Seville oranges which are available only for a very short season late January to early February.

<p>Ingredients (one gallon) 12 Seville Oranges 1 litre White Grape Juice 2½ lb. Sugar Pectolase Tannin, (or cold tea) High Alcohol or General Purpose Yeast Yeast Nutrients</p>	<p>You will use the zest of six of the oranges and the juice of all twelve, so select six with the best zest and wash them thoroughly. Take the zest and place in bucket, then press the juice from all twelve oranges and add this to the bucket. Add the sugar, dissolving this in about two pints of boiling water then make up to six pints with boiled water. When cool add the pectolase and tannin or cold tea and leave for 24 hours.</p>
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Next day add the yeast and nutrient, cover the bucket and ferment for three days with regular stirring.

Strain into a demijohn, when the fermentation has quietened pour in half the grape juice, if too much is added it might bubble out of the demijohn. If fermentation is strong allow 2/3 days before any juice is added, there is no need to rush. Keep the remainder of the juice in the fridge to top up when fermentation allows you too. When all the juice has been added top up with cool boiled water if required. Ferment to dryness and rack as usual.

**In memory of Graham Nangreave
who passed away on the 11th of December 2010**

When I was asked to write something about Graham I was pleased. Then the reality of what I had to do hit me because Graham has been my friend for, I don't know. You see Graham grew on you and the only date that I can confirm is in 2001 a happy accident happened; he and his wife Jan were staying at the same place as Chris and Carol, Telford wine club members who told them of the wine club to which they then joined. It soon became obvious that Jan with her bubbly personality and Graham just the opposite, so laid back that when I first met him I wondered where the wind up key was, but that was Graham; he was interested in you and he felt there was no reason to be interested in him.

It wasn't long before they both started to make their mark on the club, because every thing they entered they blasted well won. All of a sudden the club was shaken not stirred from its comfort zone; out of the blue they came, knew nothing about home brew but were beating the pants off us. On one such occasion I asked Graham where he had picked up the recipe for a particular winning entry. From you, but I improved it, he said with that smile that from anyone else would have offended, but that was Graham. Even on his worst days he seemed always there, always ready to help and improve as I recently learnt of his actions at the love of his life the Severn Valley Railway.

Steam trains, mention them and Graham came alive, he became the articulate academic that he was, yes a very clever chap who never once imposed or boasted about his degrees. There was the occasion that he and Jan arranged a quiz on the Severn Valley Railway with visits to places along the way finishing up at the loco sheds and that's where Graham shone. He told us about how the things worked, what had to be done to keep them working in so much detail we began to wonder if we would ever get to the bar. But he knew how we were squirming and at the point of us rebelling he calmly said "lets go for that drink"; he was in control and we loved it, he was, as the day was, brilliant.

Unfortunately in life nothing lasts for ever and the black clouds came and blighted our lives as we learnt Graham had cancer. He endured several courses of painful treatment over a long period of time without a moan; in fact when asked how he was his answer was "well you know" and that was it, he shut you down by starting a conversation on the wine club, the festival
